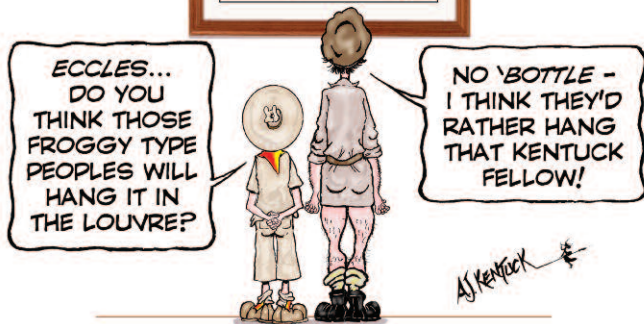

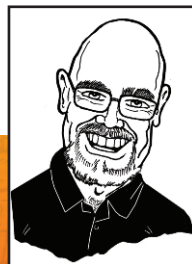

"... Brilliant!"

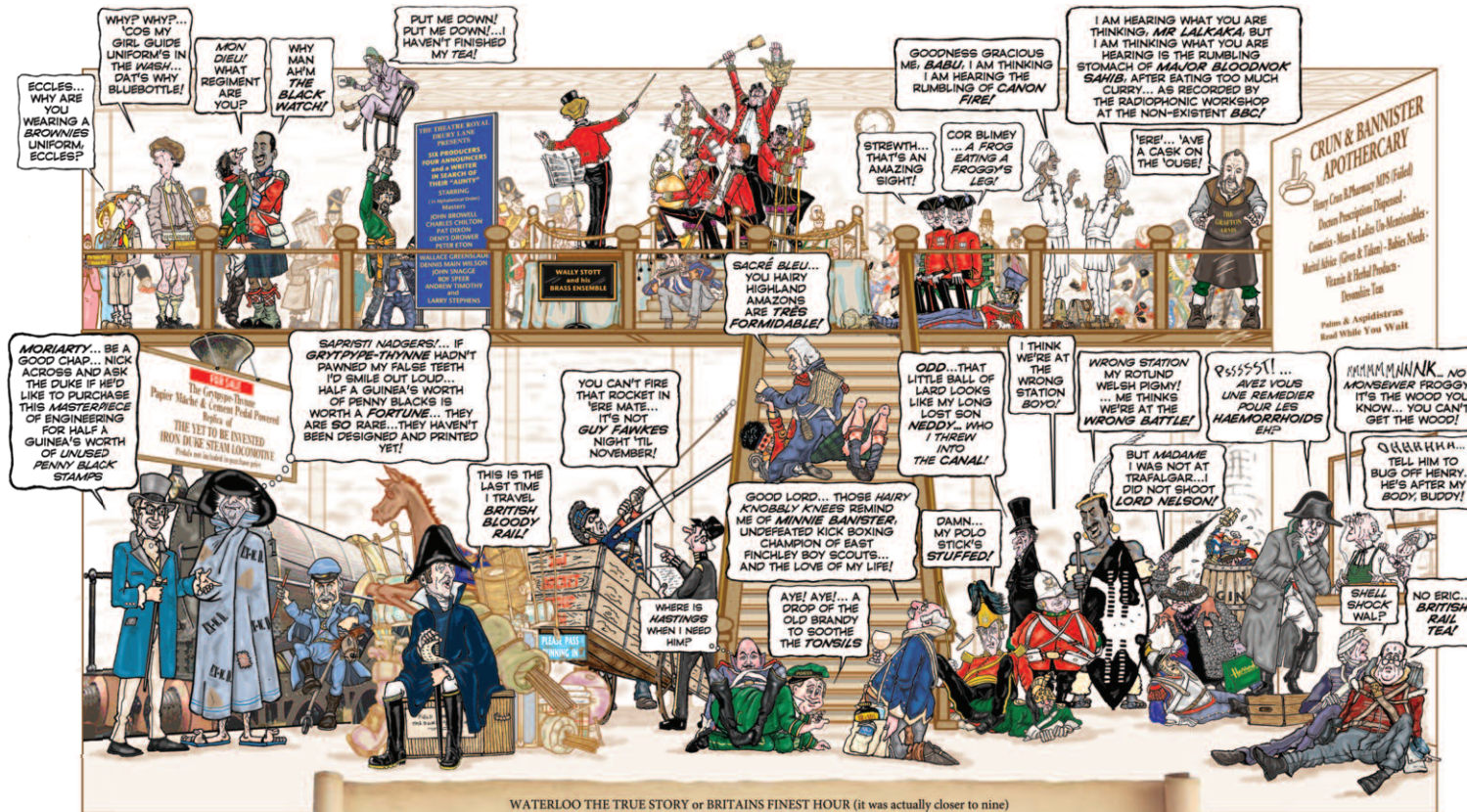

WATERLOO THE TRUE STORY or BRITAINS FINEST HOUR (it was actually closer to nine)

On Sunday the 18th of June 1815, Sir Arthur Wellesley, better known as the Duke of Wellington, travelling in the company of some army buddies, came in contact with his arch enemy Napoleon Bonaparte. Napoleon, who had just relinquished the title 'Emperor of Elbe' by reclaiming his job as Emperor of France, was right cheesed off with the Duke whom he blamed for stuffing up a lucrative property deal he'd had going in Spain and Portugal.
